## About the project

During the past year YUCOM and the Belgrade Centre for Human Rights conducted a series of seminars on how to fight discrimination. The seminars took place in ten cities throughout Serbia with more than 800 high school students participating. In addition, more than 100 education inspectors and education advisors were trained on how to recognize discrimination in the education system. Two guidebooks were produced, one for students and another for the inspectors and advisers. A large study was conducted examining the views of high school students towards minority groups, and violence and discrimination amongst high school students throughout Serbia. YUCOM continuously offers free legal aid in cases of discrimination in schools.

The project was financed by the Delegation of the European Union in Serbia, while support was also provided by the Ministry of Education and Provincial Secretariat for Education of Vojvodina. Co-operation was also established with the Commissioner for Protection of Equality and with the Children's Cultural Centre in Belgrade.









## Views of Serbian High School Students about Minority Groups, Violence, and Discrimination




### Identifying Discriminated Groups Šumadija (Jagodina)




#### Minority groups that are most discriminated










### Who is Most Discriminated?

- Roma are clearly seen as the most discriminated group. That
  is how they were identified in absolutely every school.
- The second and third place are held by different groups, depending on town and school. The LGBT population and people with disabilities are most often identified as most discriminated against after the Roma.
- In once case the second place was held by "socially disadvantaged" individuals, i.e. the poor.
- This survey question was open-ended, so the number of answers are not the same between surveys.


















Have you ever found yourself in a situation where another person has been discriminated?






## **Experiencing Discrimination**


- Respondents' views about whether they themselves have been discriminated are divided.
- In Jagodina "No" is in a slight majority, in Kragujevac "Yes" enjoys a slight majority, while in Mladenovac the answer is definitely "No".
- In Vojvodina"No" is clearly the majority answer, except in Pančevo where "No" is the majority answer, but only by a few percentage points.
- Even though the students themselves aren't always sure whether they've experienced discrimination, virtually all have witnessed discrimination against others.










### We Wouldn't be Friends

- In Niš the category with the highest plurality of answers is being friends with everyone, at 30%. However, that means that 70% of respondents do not want to be friends with at least one minority group. The same relationship appears in the aggregate result.
- In Šumadija "would with everyone" is the category with most answers only in Jagodina. On the other hand, in Mladenovac that answer is in last place.
- Least favoured friends are Albanians, Muslims and members of the LGBT population.
- In Vojvodina the answer "would with everyone" is the most frequent answer, especially in Subotica and Sombor.













### Link Between Discrimination and Violence












- Respondents could select one or more answers







### Views About the LGBT Population

- The view that homosexuality should be kept "behind closed doors" predominates, and that it is a phenomenon that should be hidden from children.
- The concept of "same rights for all" is not always well understood: in some surveys students circled "behind closed doors" and "same rights for all"
- Vojvodina is definitely the most tolerant region. In two of three surveyed cities, "same rights for all" enjoys a plurality with 30% of the respondents selecting this answer
- At the national level (all cities together) only 16% of the respondents thinks that the LGBT population should have the same rights as everyone else, which means that almost 80% condones some kind of discrimination of LGBT persons.
- Even though those surveyed did not disclose their gender, it appears that girls are more tolerant, "I would be friends with everyone", in the feminine form, often appeared as an answer to the question "who would you not be friends with?"
