Subtopics for round table discussion:

- What are the strongest shortcomings of existing dissemination of information in your respective country/ field of operation? Where are the main information bottle necks? What are the particularities of information infrastructure and institutional delivery of information in your country or in the Danube region (maybe also focus on the particular region depending on the country - Western Balkans, EU, etc, but particularly the Danube region)?
- What are some of the measures you would propose to improve the information dissemination specifically to migrants and mobile individuals? How do you think one should approach this? Who should be responsible for the effective dissemination of information to migrants and mobile individuals?
- Where do you see the possibilities of transnational cooperation in improving access to information? Are you aware of any transnational initiatives, projects that would deal with this issue? What could be a special area (what field of information access) where this would be especially important? Are there any areas that information delivery should be done only nationally, despite often circular character of migration/mobility? Where do you see the role of the new technologies in approaching information dissemination more transnationally? What are the most vulnerable groups of migrants/mobile individuals in accessing information (if no answer, try women, uneducated, old people) How could access for vulnerable groups be improved?
